

USING COMMANDS TO BUILD COOPERATION

WHAT ARE LIMITS AND BOUNDARIES IMPORTANT?

- Research tells us that having limits and boundaries guides behaviour and provides an emotional environment that supports child development.
- If limits are clear, predictable and consistent, this will help children to feel secure. Additionally, appropriate limits improve a child's social and academic behaviours.
- Compliance has been found to be hugely important in reducing difficult behaviours.

WHAT MAKES COMMANDS EFFECTIVE?

1. Using positive do commands
 2. Giving only one command at a time
 3. Keeping commands clear and brief
 5. Offer choices where possible
 6. Give warnings and reminders
 7. Avoid question commands
 8. Time to comply - Wait for response (5 seconds rule)
 9. Be polite
 10. Use distractions and redirections
 11. If child complies, follow with praise "well done for tidying your toys when I asked"
 11. If child doesn't comply, ensure appropriate consequence – "you didn't put your toys away, so you can't have your treat"
